Sacramental Information Meeting

Preparation for the Parish Sacramental Programme began with an information evening on Monday this week. Teachers of Year 4 students explained the programme involving celebrating First Holy Communion, and teachers of Year 6 did the same for Confirmation.

Fr Jimmy elaborated on the sacraments as a way we celebrate God's grace and as a sign of God's spirit acting in our lives and accompanying us on our faith journey. The Sacraments are an integral element of the connection between parish and school.

Catholic families from other schools were encouraged to participate, and several expressed interest in the programme; a big thank you to Claire Conaghty for facilitating this ministry to these families.

Shrove Tuesday

Benedict and Bosco celebrated the end of Ordinary Time and the preparation for Lent by cooking and eating pancakes. Traditionally, it was a way to destock one's supplies in preparation for fasting or abstaining from rich foods.

At Bosco, pancakes were sold to raise funds for Project Compassion. Staff and students contributed \$195 to the fundraising efforts. Our Year 9 students are organising further fundraising efforts through their SRM (Spiritualities, Religion and Meaning) subject.

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Lenten season. It is a time of preparation leading up to the remembrance of Jesus' passion and death, then celebrating his resurrection at Easter. The marking of ashes on the forehead symbolises our mortality and urgency to seek forgiveness and become better people, more open to receiving and believing the Good News through Jesus Christ.

The day began with our Year 12 students travelling to the Cathedral to attend their first Mass with parishioners for the year. At this Mass, the ashes were blessed and marked on their foreheads. Collecting ashes from this Mass, the Year 12s transported them back to

Benedict and Bosco Campuses for their respective liturgies.

Benedict Campus had a campus liturgy with the scripture reading focusing on humility and modesty in our behaviour during the Lenten season. Teachers observed several students reminding each other of this behaviour following the liturgy. It speaks to the connectedness and attentiveness of our younger students to the wisdom and truth witnessed in our Catholic identity.

Bosco Campus had four simultaneous liturgies organised in Houses around the school. At this liturgy, the Year 12s carried on the blessing of the ashes by placing them on their House members' foreheads. At these liturgies, the Year 9s from each House launched our Project Compassion fundraising campaign, with the theme 'Unite against poverty'. This theme recognises that together, we can make a massive impact on the poverty in the world. Working together to raise funds, we contribute to programmes that promote the dignity of the human person, regardless of circumstances, to allow the living of life to the full.
