Principal's Update T1, W8

Working together to enhance learning

By Week 8 of Term 1, students should be well and truly attuned to routines and expectations. I am enjoying walking through classes and seeing some of the great work students are engaged in and the achievements being recorded and reflected upon, with goals being set for future improvement. Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 have participated in NAPLAN tests with good focus, and Senior Years Learning Conversations with students and parents have started this week. It is great to see a genuine commitment to success.

When there is a consistent focus on learning and high expectations coupled with necessary supports, students make excellent progress. At both Benedict and Bosco, teachers and Educational Support Officers are working to consolidate and extend students' learning. Intervention programs are being implemented to bridge gaps in learning, particularly in literacy where skills are foundational to learning across the curriculum.

At every year level of schooling, there are things parents can do to support children to experience success:

- Encourage reading rather than screen time at home. As Mrs Freer wrote in the last newsletter, developing fluency in reading
 underpins all learning. Practising sounds and sight words at home, especially in the Early Years, and making time to model and
 encourage good reading habits will be a game changer in your children's learning. Maintaining good reading habits as students
 progress through school significantly improves learning outcomes and the ability to use language for multiple purposes in both
 writing and speaking.
- Show interest in learning. Ask questions about what is being studied and support your child in allocating time to homework and assessment tasks.
- Check in about due dates and homework requirements in the middle and senior years there is usually something to be working
 on. Help children prioritise activities to meet deadlines, which is an important life skill. External commitments, such as sport and
 part-time jobs are great for wellbeing and developing life skills, but balance is important, and paid work should not negatively
 impact learning commitments.
- Support consistent attendance as this enables continuity of learning. Regular absence adds stress to students as they can fall behind quickly. Avoid appointments or holidays during school time. There is a strong correlation between high attendance and achievement.
- For Bosco students, ensure devices are charged overnight so that students have the tools they need to be productive in class.
- · Let us know if there are any concerns so that we can work together on solutions. We all want the best for our students.

Success takes different forms, and we work to individualise what this means for our students. Success takes commitment and hard work. Your assistance and support is essential and we are grateful for all the ways that parents and guardians work with us in enhancing learning and wellbeing outcomes for our young people.

2025 Easter date common to both Eastern and Western Churches

Arguments on doctrine and statements of belief in the Universal Church throughout history have raised issues for those who disagree with the decisions or take a different viewpoint. One of these differences happens between the Western (Roman) Churches and the Eastern (Orthodox) Churches. Celebrating Easter is common to both East and West and central to our faith - in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Despite this, which date to celebrate Easter each year is still a point of difference.

In the Eastern Churches, the date is still determined using the Julian Calendar, a precursor to the Gregorian Calendar, while the Western Church uses the Gregorian Calendar. As such, the dates of Easter frequently differ between the Churches, sometimes by several weeks.

In 2025, however, the dates will align on the same day, Sunday 20 April.

Pope Francis suggests that in this Jubilee Year, with the connections between East and West at their closest, the bonds of ecumenism can be strengthened with discussions to move towards a common Easter date every year. In the past, this has been a significant barrier towards Christian unity. May we pray that their dialogue be constructive and fruitful for the benefit of all Christians.

NAPLAN

We would like to congratulate students for their positive attitude in participating in National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) testing. We wanted to provide you with important information regarding this assessment and the support available to schools and students.

We would like to extend a huge thank you to parents for prioritising this one avenue of evaluating students' knowledge and understanding. As this is merely one method for assessing students' knowledge and comprehension, we appreciate the positive perspective families have passed onto their children.

Approximately 1.3 million students from over 9,400 schools and campuses across Australia, including those in Years 3, 5, 7, and 9, have taken part in the NAPLAN test. This assessment acts as an educational "health check," measuring each student's proficiency in five key domains: numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, and grammar and punctuation. The NAPLAN results offer a clear view of students' progress and allow for comparisons with peers nationwide.

NAPLAN Testing Period

The NAPLAN tests were conducted over an 8-day period, each with particular test requirements.

Why NAPLAN Matters

NAPLAN helps to identify specific areas of strength and areas of challenge for each student, allowing teachers to provide timely intervention or extension as needed. This valuable information enables schools to have meaningful conversations with students and parents, ensuring that the right support is in place to help each student thrive.

NAPLAN Results

When you receive the NAPLAN results, they will reflect your child's proficiency in the five key domains: numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, and grammar and punctuation. The results provide information on your child's performance in each category, allowing you to understand their strengths and areas for improvement. This insight is invaluable for supporting your child's ongoing learning journey.

We encourage you to continue supporting your child by maintaining a positive mindset and fostering a love for learning. Your involvement and encouragement play a significant role in their success.


